Bioluminescence: A Survival Tactic

Marine bioluminescence has fascinated researchers since Pliny the Elder used jellyfish slime on his walking stick as a make-shift torch two-thousand years ago. You may wonder about minute sparks and brief glints of light which are seen seasonally in Long Island Sound. Missionaries proclaimed the sun "impregnated and filled the sea during the day with an infinity of fiery and luminous spirits."

What causes this? What species use it? How do they do it? What purpose does it serve? How are bioluminescent displays timed so precisely? Find out what causes the ocean to glow, as Christopher Columbus documented in 1492, just before his landfall in the Americas. Dr. Siddall answers these questions and examines evolutionary paths that led to the natural 'discovery' behind such incredible marine bioluminescent displays.

Mark Siddall is Curator, Division of Invertebrate Zoology, American Museum of Natural History. His research focuses on evolutionary biology of charismatic microfauna from microbes to leeches and bed bugs. Mark recently led expeditions to South Sudan, Cambodia and the Lower Amazon.
